Conducting Meaningful Board Discussions

Why This Matters:

One of the primary responsibilities of a board is to advise CEOs and executive management teams to make thoughtful and strategic decisions that set the organization up for long-term success. Board meetings are the primary mechanism by which board members and executives engage in meaningful discourse. There are several factors that contribute to effective board discussions including, but not limited to:

- The quality of board meeting materials
- Board agendas that dedicate appropriate time to the organization's vision and strategy
- Effective facilitation by the Board Chair
- The size of the board and the number of people present in the room during meetings
- How clear the board is about its roles and responsibilities vis-à-vis management roles and responsibilities

- Directors having the relevant skills, capabilities, and experiences to debate assumptions presented by management
- Healthy board dynamics rooted in trust and psychological safety
- Diverse views and opinions that allow for fresh perspectives. Diversity can be represented in several ways (e.g., gender, socio-economic, race and ethnicity, cognition, etc.).
